
Accelerated and Honors Classes

- NJHS will be tutoring after school twice a month on Wednesdays. Goal is to start next month.





- 75% or higher
- Consistent work ethic
- Excellent attendance
- College admissions requires minimum of 4 high school math (starting with Algebra I) classes.

- Practice in Math XI





- Counts as high school credit and is calculated in your high school GPA.
- College admission requires two consecutive years of same world language classes.
- Universities do not look at time frame when you took the course, they look at grades and overall high school GPA.



College Admissions Requirement



State Universities (as of 2021)

To be eligible for admission to a state university, a student must meet these minimum requirements.

Earn a standard high school diploma with a minimum 2.5 GPA in 18 core academic courses which are:

- 4 courses in English (at least three with substantial writing)
- 4 courses in math (Algebra I and higher level courses)
- 3 courses in natural science (at least two with a lab)
- 3 courses in social studies
- 2 courses in the same foreign language
- 2 electives

PAY FOR COLLEGE

Scholarships. Grants. Loans. Work Study. Florida offers lots of opportunities to pay for college without a mountain of debt. Learn more and make a plan.

Residency for In-State Tuition

Students who are residents of Florida pay significantly lower tuition at state colleges and universities than students from other states. The average annual in-state tuition for a public university in Florida is \$6,071 for full-time students. Tuition at state colleges is about two-thirds the amount of tuition at state universities.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the first step to applying for federal and state financial aid. You'll also need to complete a Florida Financial Aid Application. The FAFSA4caster is an online tool offered by the U.S. Department of Education that can help you understand your options for paying for college.

Bright Futures Scholarships

Bright Futures Scholarships are awarded, based primarily on academic achievement, to recent Florida high school graduates who are pursuing an undergraduate degree at a public college or university in the state. Scholarship amounts vary based on GPA, scores on college entrance exams, service hours and other factors.
